Empowering women and inmates: sewing for a cause

March 30, 2018, Puerto Princesa City, Palawan. Two sets of skills trainings on sewing Cockatoo and other wildlife keychains were completed simultaneously on March 25-27, 2018. The skills training engaged both active local partners of the Katala Foundation (KFI) in conserving the Philippine Cockatoo and its habitat in the island province of Palawan.

"Instead of wasting time doing nothing at home and getting bored, I thank Katala Foundation for this opportunity to be useful in conservation and raise awareness", says Kgd. Reynita Duguran, one of the twelve women partners from Narra and Puerto Princesa who completed the 3-day training hosted by Bgy. Luzviminda, Puerto Princesa City through its Bgy. Captain Hon. Angelita Dalma. Of the 12, six women partners from Narra, Palawan, pilot site of the Philippine Cockatoo Conservation Program implemented by the KFI. Narra holds up to 40% of the wild population of the critically endangered Philippine Cockatoo globally.

Meanwhile, 20 inmates from the Iwahig Prison and Penal Farm (IPPF) in Puerto Princesa City successfully completed the skills training finishing nearly 70 pieces of cockatoo and hornbill keychains. The participants who belong to the therapeutic community were enthusiastic and very receptive of the training which was held inside the medium security compound. This initiative offers opportunities for persons deprived of liberty (PDL) to prepare themselves once out of incarceration and better integrate themselves into the outside community.

The German Embassy and members of the German-Philippine Chamber of Commerce mainly sponsored the trainings together with the award funds from Whitley Fund for Nature. Trainors were Melanie Tan and Trinket Constantino from Manila who are both active birders in the Philippines.
